**Course Content:** The lectures will begin with an introduction to the large-scale planetary structures and processes that give rise to volcanism, initially with an emphasis on Earth. We will continue with an examination of the types of volcanoes and their eruptive styles and products, followed by a consideration of specific volcanoes and the threats they pose, along with the resources they provide. Next we shall consider historic and prehistoric volcanic activity and the possibilities for predicting future eruptions, then conclude with an overview of volcanism elsewhere in the solar system.

**Examinations:** The first examination will be on Wednesday, 26 January, 1:30-2:15 PM, and is multiple-choice. The exam may instead be taken twelve hours later. The second examination on Wednesday, 16 February, 1:30-2:15 PM, will be of similar format, focusing on the material introduced after the first exam and again may instead be taken twelve hours later. The final examination on Monday, 14 March, 2:30-4:20 PM, will be cumulative but with an emphasis on material introduced after the second exam. As with the first two exams, it may instead be taken twelve hours later. Please take each exam at whichever time is more convenient for you. Each exam may only be taken once. All exams will be administered via Canvas.

**Grading:** First exam 25%, second exam 25%, final exam 40%, and weekly discussion 10%. In calculating the contribution from weekly discussions, each person's single lowest score will be dropped.
